It helps when the building is right

- Older people, disabled people spend more time at home
- ‘Age friendly’ homes prolong independence & help offset the adverse experience of disability
- Suitable neighbourhoods that are clean, safe places with easy access to services give people confidence to
 - live independently,
 - maintain their social networks
 - participate in the wider community

....and housing does so much more

- Housing services, particularly adaptations, handyperson services-
 - prevent falls and accidents,
 - reduce delays in discharge from hospital,
 - increase home security and energy efficiency,
 - help extend the use of assistive technology, and
 - signpost people at risk to other services
- Housing organisations are often key community anchors

It brings financial benefits

- Unsuitable housing increases costs the public purse through increased injury rates, treatment and care costs.
- Adaptations improve outcomes at a lower cost,
- Extra care housing costs less than care homes and provides a better quality of life
- Housing support services delay or avoid admission to care homes.

The connection with housing

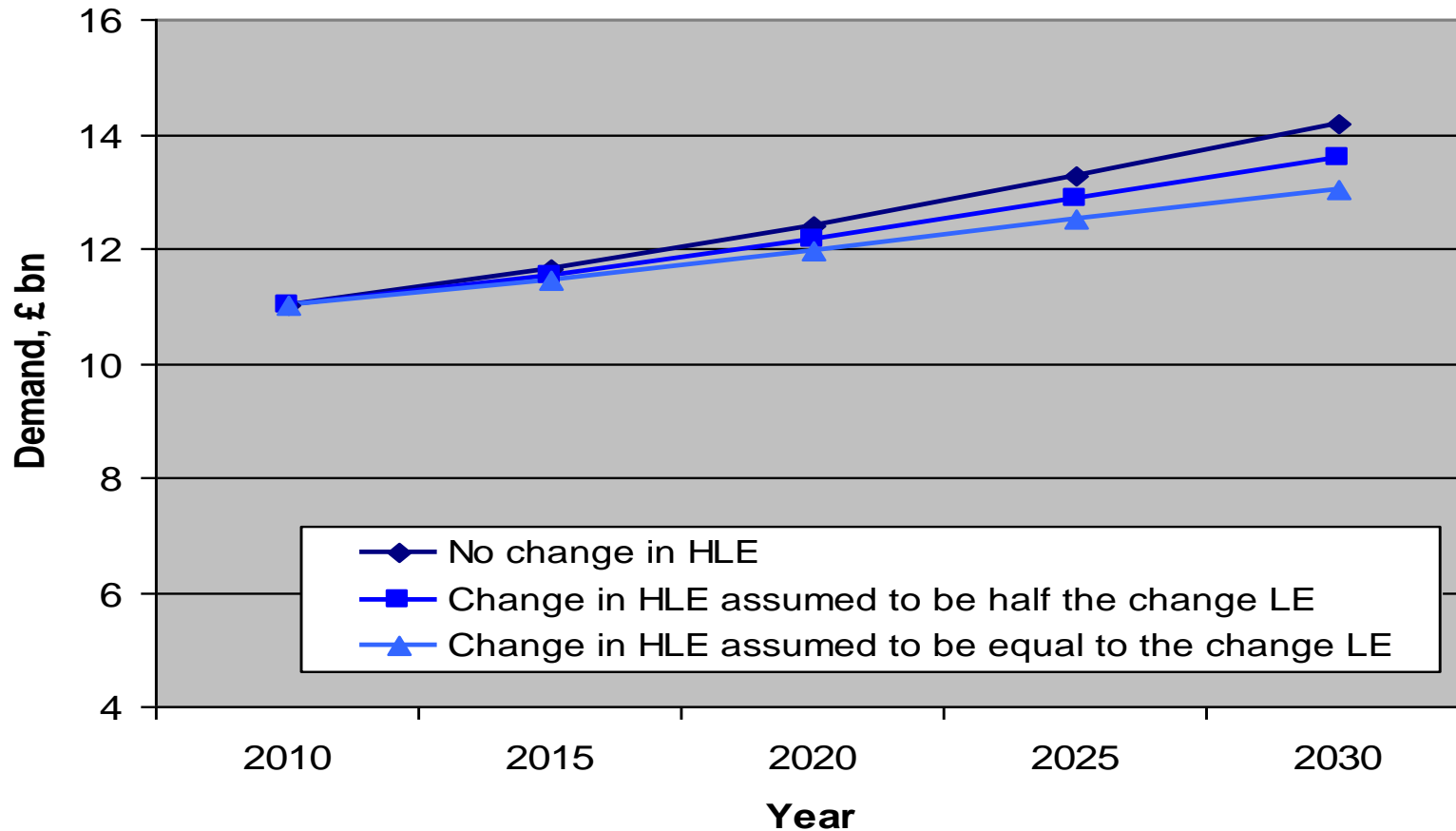
Integration is not just about health and social care services

1. Some 'housing' functions part of the integration arrangements – with the lead responsibility shifting to health and social care.
2. Delivering the national health and wellbeing outcomes requires more than health & social care services
3. Specific requirements to 'connect' around the strategic planning process

What is the problem?

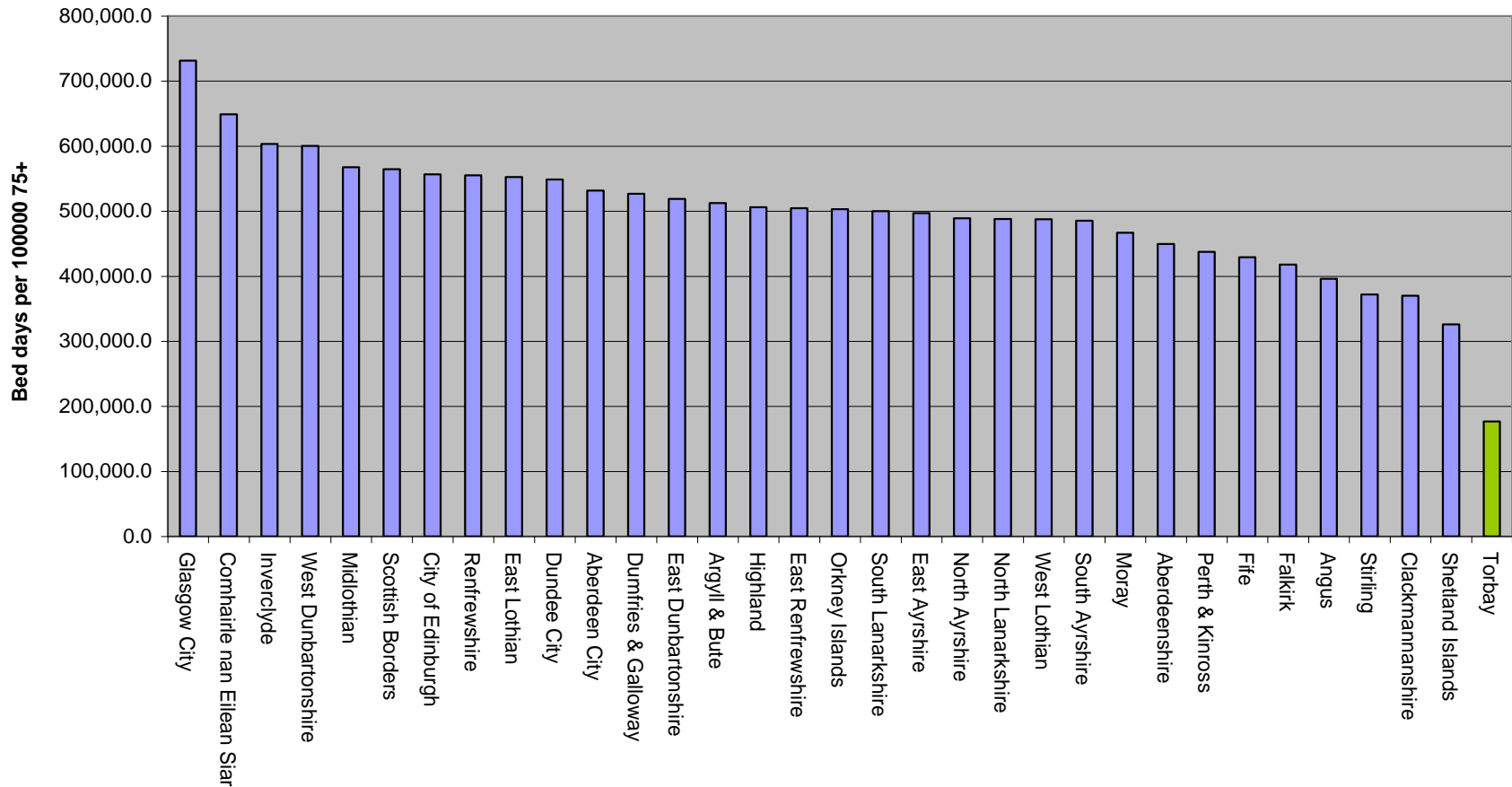
- Too much variability of health and social care in different parts of Scotland, particularly for older people.
- No incentive to help get people out of hospital quickly and back into a homely setting.
- Much easier to get people admitted to hospital than to arrange services that would keep them at home.

Public Bodies Act

- Act sets out the scope for integration
 - Includes some ‘housing’ legislation
 - Regulations set out ‘must’ and ‘may’ delegate
- National health & wellbeing outcomes to drive change
- Integrated budget – primary health, “aspects” of secondary health, social care
- Locality planning
 - At least 2 in each area

A. Housing- related functions that “must be” delegated

Act	Section/s	Functions
Housing (Scotland) Act 2001	Section 92(2)(a)	Provision of assistance to registered social landlords in relation to provision and improvement (etc) of housing, but only in so far as it relates to an aid or adaptation.
Housing (Scotland) Act 2006	Section 71(1)(b) (2)(e)&(f):	Provision of assistance to any person for housing purposes, but only in so far as it relates to an aid or adaptation.
Local Govt & Planning (Scotland) Act 1982	Section 24	Provision of gardening assistance for people with disabilities and to older people
Social Work (Scotland) Act 1968	Section 12	Assessment of need and provision of social welfare services including residential care, personal care and housing support. (NB: <i>Housing Support is a ‘must’ be delegated function only in so far as it is provided in conjunction with personal care).</i>

- Strategic commissioning plan should set how these will be delivered

Health and Wellbeing Outcomes

Outcome 2

People, including those with disabilities, long term conditions, or who are frail, are able to live, as far as reasonably practicable, independently and at home or in a homely setting in their community

Other outcomes

- **Outcome 1:** People are able to look after and improve their own health and wellbeing and live in good health for longer.
- **Outcome 4.** Health and social care services are centred on helping to maintain or improve the quality of life of service users.
- **Outcome 5.** Health and social care services contribute to reducing health inequalities.



Housing Advice Note

Statutory Guidance to Integration Authorities, Health Boards and Local Authorities on their responsibilities to involve housing services in the Integration of Health and Social Care, to support achievement of the National Health and Wellbeing Outcome

This guidance applies especially to the preparation of Integration Authorities Strategic Commissioning Plans (section 5), which must include a Housing Contribution Statement (see section 7)”
